Due to the consolidation of GBJH and ESDH in February 2025, a new Letter of Agreement and By-Laws were drawn up for 2025-26.

Please describe a summary of work undertaken by the SAC to improve student achievement and school performance.

An important focus for both schools this year, Gaetz Brook Junior High and Eastern Shore District High, was to move into the new Eastern Shore Consolidated School building. There was an open house event to offer an opportunity to both school communities to say “good-bye” to the GBJH and ESDH school buildings. Once the new school was fully open with both student bodies settled into their new learning spaces, another evening event was opened up to current families on February 27. A community focused open house event was held on May 1 as a “hello” new building. There was a large number of people who took advantage of these open

houses. ESDH opened in 1965 and GBJH opened in 1978 so there were many people who attend the “good-bye” and “hello” events.

In working with both SACs, there was much focus on building a new sense of community. The mascot unveiling occurred just prior to the move, in November, and involved student representation from both schools. The puck drop ceremony was an opportunity to bring all students and community members and opportunity to see the unveiling of the Coyote mascot with the hockey team being the first school team that would play as Eastern Shore Consolidated Coyotes. SAC Student representatives shared the various activities that Student Council supported with community building across all grade levels.

Math and literacy short cycle planning were shared. Staff representatives were to share goals and the steps in place to achieve them. With the 2 schools coming together, so did their vertical focus. This will continue to be an approach to have a unified goals of success that is grade level appropriate. For the junior high, there is an annual RWM8 that offers some additional insight for strengths and challenges with reading, writing and math. For the high school, there is an annual provincial exam for Math 10 and Eng 10 which offer similar insight. In comparing past results and current cohorts, teachers adjusted their short cycle planning to reflect common areas for re – focus and development for math and English.
